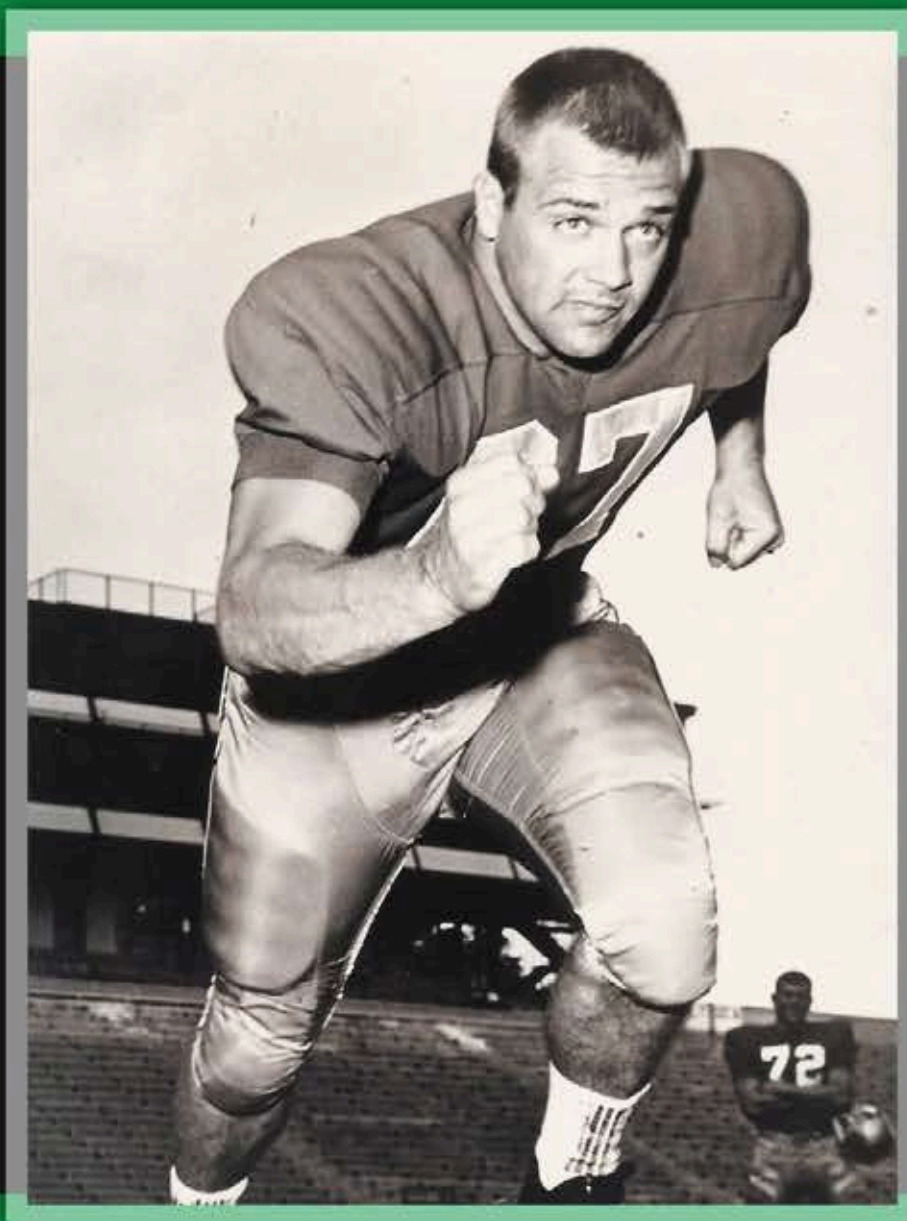


TIM BROWN

Tim Brown was a standout multi-sport athlete whose talent, determination, and leadership left a lasting legacy at Port Washington High School and beyond. A true competitor, Tim participated in football, track, basketball, and baseball—all four sports, all four years—earning All-State honors in football. On the track, he was known for his blazing speed, running the 100-yard dash in just 10.0 seconds and anchoring Port Washington's top relay team. A scholar-athlete in every sense, Tim graduated with honors, excelling both academically and athletically throughout his high school career. His impressive GPA and football talent earned him an appointment to the U.S. Naval Academy at Annapolis—a rare and prestigious opportunity. However, the offer was later withdrawn due to his red/green color blindness, which disqualified him from eligibility under Naval standards at the time.

Despite standing just 5'9", Tim's impact on the football field was nothing short of remarkable. His stature only made his accomplishments more impressive. He earned a full athletic scholarship to Iowa State University, where he played from 1960 to 1963 as both an offensive guard and a defensive end. He lettered in his final two seasons and was named 2nd Team All-Big Eight as a senior—an honor that reflected his toughness, versatility, and relentless work ethic at the Division I level.

Following college, Tim continued his football career professionally in Canada, beginning with the Montreal Rifles, and later spending multiple seasons with the Toronto Rifles. Remarkably, Tim played competitive football well into his early 40s, finishing his career with the East Toronto Trojans, a testament to both his athletic longevity and his passion for the game.

Whether on the field, in the classroom, or in life, Tim Brown embodied grit, humility, and quiet excellence. His achievements and character continue to inspire generations of students and athletes, and his legacy remains a proud chapter in the history of Port Washington High School.
